JAMES' JOURNAL Being Together is Good



When I candidated to be your minister 8 years ago, one of the first things I remember saying to everyone at a shared meal was "Please repeat after me:

It is good... It is good to be.... It is good to be together...."

One of the simple and profound joys I have in my ministry with all of you is to eat together. My family recently hosted 18 total people for Gourmet Dining For A

Great Cause. We thought it was fun to host. It also felt satisfying to just sit around the table and see where the conversation went. I couldn't help but harken back to my childhood where every other Sunday afternoon some extended family members would come over for a roast. My uncle would always bring his famous cheesecake. We would play cards and other games, eat, tell stories, and just be.

We can harken back even further to ancient times where people would gather to eat. We all must eat and maybe it is more efficient to cook for a large group. But there is something about eating together that transcends physical nourishment. Eating together somehow provides spiritual nourishment. It's no wonder why Christians and Jews ritualize meals.

At the last Third Thursday Soup at the church, we combined two tables and about a dozen or so of us engaged in conversation. We talked about the legalization of marijuana, wild mushrooms, baking, you name it. Nothing was forced. Everything flowed. We did not speak of profound things about the universe. We were just together talking, laughing, and telling stories.

It is good to be together.

They had their unique lives and lived them out just as our family did as the occupants before us. We all arrive, we settle, we move on.

My wish for all who are temporarily settled is that the words of Hymn #1 May Nothing Evil Cross This Door be true for you.

FAITH ENGAGEMENT

At <u>General Assembly</u> this year from June 20-23, congregations will be voting to approve changes to Article 2 of the UUA's bylaws, which guides our operating principles and purpose. Check out the proposed revision by clicking <u>here</u>.

These changes will have a direct impact on how we teach religious education in the future. It means a change to our <u>7 Principles</u>. We have been using these for over a decade to help our children and youth understand what it means to be Unitarian Universalist.



The new covenant states: "As Unitarian Universalists, we covenant, congregation-to-congregation and through our Association, to support and assist one another in our ministries. We draw from our heritages of freedom, reason, hope, and courage, building on the foundation of love. Love is the power that holds us together and is at the center of our shared values. We are accountable to one another for doing the work of living our shared values through the spiritual discipline of Love. Inseparable from one another, these shared values are justice, equity, transformation, pluralism, interdependence and generosity."

If adopted, our religious education program will look to these new values as we continue to provide meaningful faith development for our children and youth. May it be so.

SUMMER WORSHIP SERIES

The Worship Team is excited to bring you another special summer worship series. Like last summer, the series will feature different worship formats befitting the summer season. They will occur on the eight Sundays beginning July 7 and ending on August 25. We have brought back some of the formats from last summer along with another modified format, as well as an outdoor service!

We will provide more detail in the July-August Newsletter, but here is what you can look forward to:

• **Coffee and Conversation**: Two or three times this summer you will have the opportunity to talk with other community members about topics important to our congregation. These conversations will take place in the Romer room and will be facilitated by members of the Worship Team and other church groups. Individuals will be able to participate via Zoom. And of course, there will be coffee – and tea, juice, and goodies!

• **Contemplating Big Questions**: This represents a new format we are exploring this summer. These services will begin in the sanctuary for an abbreviated liturgy, including most of the elements of the service except the sermon. Interactive Events: A couple of times this summer, Carol Zimmerman, Director of Religious Education, will lead us on a spiritual adventure appropriate for everyone from toddlers to elders.

• **Outdoor Service**: Yes, we will have an outdoor service this summer! We hope to have the service at Taylor Park. This service will be filled with readings, sermonettes by members of the congregation, and music. We will then enjoy fellowship over a potluck lunch. Feel free to make a day of it at the beach!

2024 Rachel Somers Grant Social Action Award Congratulations to John Tenbusch

John Tenbusch was selected as this year's recipient of the award for his 20+ years of exemplary community service and involvement in issues concerning housing, environmental stewardship, and a diversity of other social justice causes.

Tenbusch's duties at the County Planning Office focused on issues of St. Lawrence County, particularly the provision of safe, decent, affordable housing. His dedication to the effort resulted in hundreds of units being purchased and/or preserved for future affordable use at little or no cost to hundreds of low- and moderate-income

households. Tenbusch is recognized for his outstanding service to the community through his leadership in such grassroots volunteer efforts as: the Poor People's Campaign of St. Lawrence County, Black Lives Matter, Fair Housing task force, Juneteenth Committee, and the Raquette River Valley Habitat for Humanity. Tenbusch has worked tirelessly to advance environmental sustainability in the region. He volunteered for the county's household hazardous waste collection days and worked on energy efficiency issues with the New York State Council of Churches. He is responsible for creating an ecumenical faith and ecology group which has inspired more faith-based environmentally sustainable behavior.

A nomination letter for Tenbusch stated, "*His compassion and appreciation of others has helped people directly and inspired many to act with him.*" Another states: "*John has made and continues to make a huge positive difference. The list of his volunteer involvement and transformative service to others is long. We are better because of him.*"

The award will be presented during worship on **Sunday**, **June 16**. The service will be followed by a reception and coffee hour in the social room. All are welcome to attend.

NAVIGATING THE SPIRITUAL JOURNEY Thursday, June 13 at 7p.m. in the Romer Room

Embarking on a spiritual journey is a deeply personal pursuit that prompts one to investigate the world to gain insight into one's self, one's life, and the meaning of it all. The two-hour workshop led by the Rev. James Galasinski will explore what spirituality is and engage participants in activities and conversations about beliefs, morals, values, and personal spiritual experiences.

During the workshop participants will map their own journeys and begin to define what a spiritual practice is and frameworks for thinking about spirituality. There will be small group discussions about how each person thinks about ethics and morality as well as discussions about how humans connect with each other and that which is greater than oneself.



The workshop will promote personal reflection about how spirituality manifests in various forms within us whether through religion, meditation, nature, or holistic healing traditions. Participants will be invited to create their own awe-inspiring journey of truth and discovery and will depart with an understanding of the spiritual practices that nurture them and a personal road map to consider possible directions to be taken on a near future spiritual journey.
