FROM OUR PRESIDENT Welcome to Our New Tenants

At this year's September 4 Church Council meeting a 2-year lease agreement was approved between our Church and the Family Counseling Service of NNY, Inc. and the Resolution Center of Jefferson & Lewis Counties, Inc. For simplicity, I will henceforth refer

to these entities as the Resolution Center. The organization is expanding their counseling and mediation services into St. Lawrence County and our space is in an optimal location for them.

The Resolution Center will occupy two basement rooms during 5 weekdays as offices and one room on Mondays as a counseling room. This arrangement is compatible with the RE program. Appointments will be scheduled and there will not be "walk-ins". Signage will direct people to these rooms. I feel that this will be a great partnership. The Resolution Center performs valuable work that supports our values and we can provide them space in which to operate while deriving rent. Many thanks to Rev. James who first explored this arrangement with the Resolution Center's Executive Director Jennifer Huttemann-Kall, and Carol Zimmerman and Sara Trimm for working with me on several details in the lease agreement.

We fulfill our mission in a variety of ways, some direct, some indirect, some collective, some singular. Regardless, each way arises from our individual actions as Unitarian Universalists. You are part of this picture!

FAITH ENGAGEMENT

Our religious education program strives to create an accepting environment that empowers children and youth to explore their spirituality, celebrate diversity, and live our Unitarian Universalist values. During the recent RE Teaching Ministry Orientation, teaching teams, RE committee members and I worked together to create an outline for this year's program. I am proud to share the plan for religious education this year.



Using the <u>new UU Values</u> as the overall theme for the year, each month we will focus on a value. With love at the center, we will explore the values of Justice, Equity, Transformation, Pluralism, Interdependence and Generosity. With approximately 25 teachers/assistants now (we had over 65 pre-COVID), we determined that providing religious education for (5) different classes every Sunday wasn't feasible. Except for the nursery, we determined that we could provide different age classes approximately twice a month, host all ages Living Our Values Every Day (L.O.V.E.D.) Activities on the other Sundays and four Fun Days on holiday weekends. Our classes will include Nursery for infants to 3-year-olds, Spirit Play for 4-year-olds to 1st grade, Lego ValUUes for 2nd-4th grade, Makerspace for 5th-7th grade, Coming of Age for 8th-9th grade and Youth Group for 8th-12th grade.

Even with this plan, we still need (2) assistants for the 2nd-4th grade class, (2) teachers for Coming of Age and (1) advisor for youth group and will we need folx to lead some of the L.O.V.E.D. activities. 2025 CANVASS: Remembering Our Past, Celebrating Our Present, Securing Our FutUUre.

The friends and members' pledges to our congregation is by far the largest revenue stream we have. We could not be a congregation without your pledge. This year's canvass will involve one-to-one meetings with trained canvassers. Expect a letter in the mail explaining the process and a phone call to schedule a time to get together. These are conversations where we get to know each other better and find out why we love this congregation.

While our canvass team would love to meet with all members and friends living in the North Country, it's not possible given the number of canvassers.

The 2025 Canvass goal is \$254,000, which is about \$10k more than what we raised last year. The Canvass will begin on Sunday October 6, 2024, with a goal to be finished by November. It is very important to get your pledges in by November so the Budget and Finance Committee can prepare the final budget for 2025.

I JUST READ...

ONE SUNNY DAY by Hideko Tumura Snider is a revelation of the Hiroshima atomic bomb impact on one Life. Hideko came to the US after WW II for college and graduate school in the midwestern United States, later marrying an American and obtaining citizenship. Her memories were first written for therapy and to educate her children. This expanded edition of the book, published in 2021, describes the lifelong effects of the atomic bomb blast. It is a deeply personal and insightful story. Hideko speaks publicly to promote Peace throughout the world. The <u>One Sunny Day Foundation</u> encourages a planting of Peace Trees worldwide. Our UU Church will participate in this endeavor by planting a Peace Tree in late October. A copy of this book is available in the UU Church Library and at the Canton Public Library.

Social Action Team invites your ideas and engagement

Our Social Action Team recently discussed ways to invite and encourage engagement with the important social justice work our congregation does in our communities. We've renamed ourselves as our <u>Social Action Team</u>, which reflects that our congregation works together as individuals and in groups to support the values and principles of UUism. We don't just talk the talk; we promote active participation in a wide variety of events and projects for social justice.

Please thank Pat Alden for her leadership of SA over the past few years. Paul Siskind will be the new Team Coordinator.

Our evolution from a "committee" to a "team" reflects our role in our congregation: We are the nexus point for helping to organize our individual and collective work. We're reframing our mission to focus on providing support for specific issues, events, and projects for the congregation to engage with. Our SA Team will help you gather and share information and resources to help you develop, organize, and implement your ideas. When appropriate, we will make connections with other committees within our church and/or outside organizations in our communities. In other words, the SA Team will be a resource to help us all "walk the walk" and "do the work" of social justice, both individually and collectively.

Thus, we invite all congregants to bring us your ideas for issues, events, and projects that you think people in our congregation might be interested in engaging with. We welcome ideas and projects ranging in scope from specific requests like "I work with Organization X, and we're looking for volunteers to help us with Event Y on date Z," to broader ideas like "I think our congregation might like to know more about Issue X, so I'd like to organize a series of films and discussions about it. How do we do this?"

And as before, the SA Team will continue to coordinate our Church's ongoing projects such as our Social Action Shared Offerings (SASOs), our Social Justice Initiative (SJI), and the Rachel Somers Grant Social Action Award.

In October, the SA Team will continue working on issues at play in the upcoming election:

- Encouraging voter engagement (and fighting voter suppression) in "battleground" states.
- Support for NY Proposal 1, aka the NY Equal Rights Amendment.

Panel Discussion about NY Proposal 1 (the NYS Equal Rights Amendment) presented by the League of Women Voters Wednesday, October 9, 7:00 p.m. in the Romer Room

Before you vote this fall, join us for a panel discussion of Proposal 1, also known as the "New York Equal Rights Amendment." Proposal 1 will appear on the back of your ballot and if passed it would add to the existing protections against discrimination based on race and religion. Prop 1 would explicitly prohibit discrimination by the government based on a person's ethnicity, national origin, age, disability, and sex—including pregnancy and pregnancy outcomes (including abortion), sexual orientation, gender identity and expression. The amendment would explicitly safeguard reproductive autonomy and access to reproductive health care in the state constitution.

The panel will include representatives from Planned Parenthood of the North Country NY, ACR Health's Q Center, and the Statewide Senior Action Council. The panel will be sponsored by the St. Lawrence County League of Women Voters.

Zen Garden Tour at St. Lawrence University (WiSPP)

As part of the World Spiritual Practices Project, Mark McWilliams, St. Lawrence University Professor Religious Studies and Co-Director of the North Country Japanese Garden will host a garden tour on **Thursday**, **October 10**, **1 p.m. - 2:30 p.m.** in the Sykes Courtyard at St. Lawrence University.

There will be a tour of the history and elements of the garden, with an explanation of the different religious elements within the design, and how one might see the garden in the context of Buddhist practice. The second half of the tour is a hands-on activity where participants will make their own ema or votive tablet which they can leave in the garden to elicit good luck. The Japanese Zen Garden tour is a chance to extend your understanding of Buddhism and is part of the year-long World Spiritual Practices Project (WiSPP) grant from the Unitarian Universalist Association funding program (UUFP). Garden tour participants will meet at 12:50 p.m. on the St. Lawrence University campus at the flagpole outside the Sykes Courtyard. The garden tour is free and open to all, a voluntary contribution of \$5 is suggested to pay for your votive prayer tablets that can be left in the garden or taken home as a souvenir. MacWilliams studied Buddhism as an undergraduate student at Syracuse University and practiced sitting meditation under a variety of Zen teachers from Korea and Japan. He began his life-long interest in the bodhisattvas Kannon and Jizo, beings of mercy and compassion who are a major focus of devotion throughout East Asia. MacWilliams dedicated the North Country Japanese Garden to Manabi Jizo, a form of the bodhisattva who is dedicated to helping those who are studying and learning.
