FAITH ENGAGEMENT

Are you a parent, guardian or caregiver of children? Are you feeling the pressure of raising children and preparing them for the world we live in? Are you feeling totally stressed to the max? Would you like a time and space to talk with others who share this journey? Would you like an opportunity to not cook for a night? Our church sees you and wants to help.



In August of this year, the Department of Health and Human Services published <u>"Parents Under Pressure: The U.S. Surgeon General's Advisory on the Mental Health and Well-Being of Parents".</u> This public announcement calls the public's attention to this urgent public health issue and provides recommendations on how it can be addressed. According to the report, 41% of parents say that most days they are so stressed they cannot function and 48% say that most days their stress is completely overwhelming compared to other adults (20% and 26%, respectively). It highlights financial strain, time demands, children's health and safety, parental isolation, social media and cultural pressures as the top stressors. Our parents are stressed out!

One of the many suggestions for community organizations is "to create opportunities to cultivate supportive social connections among parents and caregivers." To this end, the religious education program will be offering (3) "Together at the Table" events for families with children on the following Fridays: November 15, January 24 and April 4 from 5:30-7:00pm. No need to bring anything, come as you are. If your children are busy, parents are welcome to come on their own. This will be a time to come together for a prepared meal, cozy connection, fun and spiritual nurturing. Look for more details on our website and social media pages and plan to RSVP.

As the report states, "Raising children is sacred work. It should matter to all of us." It matters to our church. We want to be one of the places for this sacred work. May it be so.
