JAMES' JOURNAL Getting Involved on the State Level

On Friday November 15th, the Rev. David Weissbard and I traveled to Albany to attend a Justice Convocation put on by New York Unitarian Universalist Justice (NYUUJ) at the UU Church of Albany. We started with worship. We heard a panel discussion on how to get bills passed in Albany. We had lunch. Then there were four workshops on the 4 main issues NYUUJ is focused on: Medical Aid in Dying, Climate Justice, Housing Justice, and Criminal/Legal Reform.

NYUUJ is a state advocacy network that collaborates with issue partners and UUs across the state to pass bills that are aligned with our values.
