#### JAMES' JOURNAL The Complexities of History



I've always been intrigued by history, how the past informs the present and how, over time, facts of the past get reinterpreted.

A few months ago, I was asked to be part of a small team of former and current St. Lawrence University faculty and staff and alums to investigate the life of the Rev. Jeffrey W. Campbell. He is known as the first Black graduate of St. Lawrence University. He ran for governor of Massachusetts

and while living in England tutored miners and other workers in literature, philosophy, and history. He was also for 3 decades a high school English teacher at the Putney School. The whole time he was an ordained Universalist and Unitarian minister who never got a full-time position because he was Black. He was many things. Even the label of "Black" does not quite get at his self-identity because he was mixed race and, in his writings, identifies more with being a New Englander, socialist and Universalist more than any other identities. He was an integrator of white institutions for sure. In talking to people that knew him I found out he was theatrical, poetic, and charismatic. The hope is that this research can eventually become a book. My role is to give a UU minister's perspective.



# **BICENTENNIAL EVENTS**



#### Medical Aid in Dying:

This spring, our congregation will continue supporting the campaign to pass the Medical Aid in Dying bill at the State Capitol. The legislation would allow a terminally ill adult with a prognosis of 6 months or less to live to have the option to request, obtain, and decide to ingest medication to die peacefully in their sleep if their suffering is unbearable; it is sometimes referred to as Death with Dignity. *If you would like to be on our e-mail list about MAiD events, please contact* paul@paulsiskind.com.
